Washington, One Hundred and Twenty-Five Years Ago, Supervised Survey Which Led to the Stones Being Placed Around the Ten-Mile Square—City Was Unnamed at That Time.

The east corner sione stands on the old Lee estate, in the midst of a rich and cultivated field. The west stone is near Falls Church, just one mile north of it It is badly broken, a piece of quite good size having been severed from the monument stone itself. The broken piece is not lost, however, but lies near at hand, Of the other boundary stones, classed as mile stones, fourteen are reported in really very fair condition; ten others show signs of the wear and tear of exdense woods, all rather difficult to find; eight others are in fields which are well cultivated, and they have been undis-turbed. Six of the thirty-nine are in bad ondition; one lies partially buried by the Fotomac, whose waters swirl and sweep around it.
