JOHNS LINDSAY CHAPTER, D. A. R., dedicated a District boundary stone on the Walker road, west of Good Hope road, Wednesday afternoon, with impressive ceremonies. The Rev. John Britton Clark, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, led the devotional exercises. The regent, Mrs. Ellis Logan, gave the address of welcome and introduced the speakers. The address was given by Senator Charles S. Thomas, of Colorado, who paid an eloquent tribute to the patriotic service of women throughout the country from revolutionary times to the present. He spoke in detail of the many monuments erected and places marked by patriotic organizations and of the splendid services rendered and practical lessons in patriotism taught by the Daughters of the American Revolution. Mrs. Charles S. Thomas, of Colorado, vice president general N. S. D. A. R., received the floral tribute from the children and placed it over the boundary stone. J. Edson Briggs sealed the gate and presented the key to the chapter.
